## **Technical Tips and Tricks (TTT)**

#### **How to Flush your Transmission**

As you may remember from the Nov/Dec newsletter, my burgundy 90 300SL suffered from transmission fluid contamination requiring a new main valve replacement. For such a low mileage car this was a rare and unexpected problem that worried me, so I decided to do a thorough flush of the transmission fluid. No task to be done by the faint of heart.

- · To begin, I purchased 4 gallons (15 liters) of Valvoline Full Synthetic Transmission Fluid (photo 1).
- · I disconnected the transmission outlet behind the car's radiator.
- · I connected the outlet line from the transmission to a clear plastic tube (photo 2) which I ran to a 3 liter empty container.
  - · I started the engine and watched the fluid filling up the container (photo 3).
  - · I then shut off the engine and topped up the transmission with 3 liters of new transmission fluid.
- I repeated this process 4 more times while running the fluid through all the gears, essentially purging the system of old fluid and replacing the system with new fluid.

We're now fully cleaned and running like new.

## Saving Charlie, Part 2, Seats

The next step in getting our salvaged 2003 Mercedes CL500 up to par was to deal with the cracked and ripped leather seats. The car came from Fresno, California, so the seats have been baked in the hot and dry California sun and looked like it.

After reviewing a few YouTube videos on this topic, it appeared that with the CL500, the solution is to replace the entire cushion, not just re-cover the existing cushions with new leather. I did replace the leather upholstery on the seats of our old 1994 SL500, but this was a different process.

I needed to replace both seat cushions and the driver's seatback. It took a few weeks of scouring ebay to find all three cushions in the matching color (black). Then it's only a matter of pulling each seat out and starting to work. Unbolting the seats is a simple process, with only 4 bolts holding them in place. There are two

electric connections and a vacuum connection in the front of the seat. One of the most difficult parts of the process is to remove the seats from the car. They weigh a ton(!) and are very bulky.

Once the seat is on the workbench, there are two different ways to replace the seat cushion, with or without the frame. On one seat, I received the cushion mounted on its frame. This was very easy to replace as



it only required removing the four screws holding the frame to the power seat adjuster, sliding the old cushion out, sliding the new cushion in and re-attaching the four screws. There are a couple of electric connectors to simply unplug before removing the cushion.

The other seat cushion came without the frame, so I had to remove the cushion from the frame. Same process as the first seat, but the cushion is held in place with a tab folded into a grove on the frame. This takes a little longer, but it is not very difficult.

Replacing the seatback is a bigger project. Before you remove the seat from the car, run the headrest all the way up. Then you remove the seatback cover (facing the backseat) by removing two screws from the bottom of the panel and it slides out.

Next, you have to remove the headrest by pushing it up

and out of the clip holding it to the adjuster. Finally, the seatbelt and seat release lever has to be unbolted. The cushion slides up over the seatback frame. The new cushion slides back into place with a little wiggling and a lot of patience.

Overall, it was a 3 hour project to fix both seats and well worth the time. Each cushion set me back a little over \$100, so the total cost was about \$340.

So far, Charlie has provided 5,000 miles and we still enjoy the powerful engine and almost magic handling of the ABC hydraulic suspension. Stay tuned for future updates on this project.

## Another Visit to the Art Deco World

Back in our July-August 2021 newsletter, I presented some photographs of four extraordinary vehicles from an exhibit entitled "Sensuous Steel: Art Deco Automobiles". Automobiles produced during the 1920s and '30s, they showcased the epitome of engineering, style and coachbuilding of the time. In this issue, I want to present a few more of these magnificent works, that have survived to delight our senses today.





The 1934 Voisin Type C27 Aerosport is a two seater coupe and one of only two built. It includes such refinements as an aluminum body, three liter six cylinder sleeve-valve engine, no metal framework above the windshield, and a vacuum motor to operate the sliding roof.





With its sleek aerodynamic styling, the 1936 Delahaye 135M was intended for rally competition. Built on one of 50 short chassis, the body is aluminum, it has a four liter engine, a four speed transmission, and the dash includes a state-of-the-art Jaeger rally clock. The windshield swings out at the bottom for ventilation and the top has a sliding sun roof.





The 1938 Talbot Largo T-150C-SS Teardrop by Figoni & Falaschi. One could spend all day thinking up words to describe it: sensuous, curvacious, streamlined, sleek, alluring, captivating. This is the first of 12 that were built in this style and the one used to patent the "teardrop" style. It has an alloy body, six cylinder, four liter, hemi engine, and a finger tip actuated transmission so your hands never left the steering wheel. A competition prepared one came in third in the 1938, 24 Hours of Le Mans.





The 1939 Delage D8-120S cabriolet with body by Saoutchik, was Delage's ultimate luxury car prior to WWII. The engine is a 4.75 liter straight 8 of 120 bhp. This one is one of the last of 56 built, and was hidden away just prior to Germany invading France. Visually beautiful with its sweeping curves and portholes for the exhaust, it also has Saoutchik's newly patented sliding parallel doors that opened outward and slid back along the side of the car for easy entrance and exit.

I hope you have enjoyed our trip back to the Art Deco era when style, craftmanship, and mechanical innovation were paramount among leading automobile manufacturers and coachbuilders. Although much of the era occurred during the Great Depression, It was a time when innovation flourished.
